

158 households were prevented from becoming homeless during quarter four 2016/17, against a quarterly target of 250, **63%** of the target.


The year-end prevention figure for 2016/17, **570**, is **333 (37%)** fewer preventions than the 2015/16 total of **903**.

- Cases assisted to obtain alternative accommodation



This year has seen a **52%** increase in the number of households approaching as homeless.




273 households approached the authority as homeless during quarter four 2016/17, compared to 296 during quarter four 2015/16, a reduction of 23 (8%).

Ethnicity




Reasons for Non-Acceptance




120 households were accepted as homeless during quarter four 2016/17, compared to **114** during quarter four 2015/16, an increase of **6 (5%)**.

The year-end figure for acceptances was **499**. The final acceptance figure saw an increase of **122 (32%)** from the 2015/16 total of **377**. The figure was also **129 (35%)** more than the year-end target of **370**.

The main reasons for acceptances continue to be loss of rented or tied accommodation and relatives or friends no longer willing or able to accommodate.

131 households were accepted for homelessness as a result of violence during 2016/17. This figure increased by 62 (90%) from the 2015/16 total of 69.


Immediate Outcome








Homelessness approach and acceptance figures for Derby in quarter three of 2016/17 compared to Leicester and Nottingham.

The level of homelessness approach and acceptance for each local authority can be affected by a number of factors, such as a greater availability of alternate housing outside of the statutory route.

Social housing provision is also proportionally greater in Leicester and Nottingham along with both being awarded disproportionate homeless grant monies when compared with Derby, despite lobbying through the 'Fair Deal for Derby' Campaign.

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
